Our research team was the first to evaluate differences in the effectiveness of brief motivational interventions (BMI) for heavy drinking among Latinos and non-Latinos. We demonstrated that heavy-drinking Latinos who received BMI were significantly more likely than those receiving standard care to reduce alcohol use at six- and twelve-month follow-ups (Field & Caetano, 2010; Field, Caetano, Harris, Frankowski, & Roudsari, 2010). In this comparative effectiveness study, we will examine the efficacy of a culturally-adapted BMI in a community hospital setting where at-risk, heavy-drinking Mexican-origin men who are unlikely to have sought formal treatment for alcohol problems present for medical treatment of an alcohol-related injury. We will randomize 600 heavy-drinking Mexican-origin men admitted to a community hospital setting for medical treatment of an alcohol-related injury to receive a either a non-

adapted brief motivational intervention (NA-BMI) or a culturally adapted brief motivational intervention (CA-BMI). We hypothesize that by accounting for culturally relevant risk (i.e., acculturative stress) and protective factors (i.e., familism) of heavy drinking among Latinos, CA-BMI will more effectively improve patient outcomes. Relative to NA-BMI, CA-BMI will more effectively decrease alcohol use and alcohol problems and increase help seeking and treatment utilization at follow up. This study will provide evidence for novel approaches to reduce alcohol problems and increase help-seeking and treatment utilization in a population of underserved, Latinos who are disproportionately affected by alcohol problems yet less likely to receive adequate treatment.

The primary purpose of the screening and brief motivational intervention (S-BMI) program is to reduce binge drinking in the Paso del Norte region by implementing and evaluating S-BMI in medical and community based settings. S-BMI is an evidence based intervention to reduce the public health burden of binge drinking. Binge drinking and its consequences disproportionately affect ethnic minorities, particularly Hispanics. In randomized controlled intervention trials, we have demonstrated that S-BMI in medical settings is particularly effective among Hispanics (C. Field & Caetano, 2010; C. A. Field, Caetano, Harris, Frankowski, & Roudsari, 2010). The proposed program will allow us to translate this research into practice through implementation and evaluation in community settings in the Paso Del Norte region.
