RESEARCH PROGRAM

Since doing my dissertation, titled "Caregiver burden and institutionalization of the elderly in Taiwanese families," I have grown increasingly interested in the role of caregivers in providing assistance to older adults with physical and cognitive impairments. In particular, the influences of filial values, acculturation, dyadic mutuality on caregiving activities and health outcomes that appear to be different for Hispanic families. I have done several instrument developments on the motives for the elder care (i.e., filial piety, family loyalty, and mutuality) and on a common caregiving task (i.e., family caregiver medication administration hassles) to study family care among Mexican Americans, the largest Hispanic population in the U.S. In addition, the effects of acculturation and mutuality on filial care were also investigated.

The aforementioned studies were funded by the following sources: intramural faculty grant, Sigma Theta Tau, TIAA-CREF, NINR (T32), and American Nurses Foundation. These projects laid a solid foundation for Mexican American family caregiving studies with aging adults. Hispanic American aged population is rapidly growing and often underserved. After reading previous NIH reviewers' comment summary on my R01 application, I am applying for small grants to conduct a feasibility study listed in the following column (e.g., Sigma Theta Tau research grant) to purchase expired materials and supplies due to COVID-19 prohibiting me from data collection. The future field study will crosscheck objective biomarkers and subjective report of caregiving stress to detect the long-term caregiving stress induced increased allostatic load and coronary heart disease (CHD) risks in Mexican American women long-term caregivers of a dependent older adult targeting a NIH R grant mechanism. In addition, caregiving stress, allostatic load and CHD risks could be buffered by psychosocial factors (e.g., SES, social support, and mutuality) specifically to Mexican American culture. Thus, finding the controllable variable could be further designed as an intervention study to control the long-term caregiving stress induced increased CHD risks. Heart disease is number one cause of death in Mexican American women. Long-term caregiving stress may deteriorate the CHD prevalence and deserve more attention from healthcare community.

Care for Mexican American Women Caregivers-A Feasibility Study Statement of the Problem

Currently, 7.6 million (21%) *Hispanic women* are providing long-term (*LT*) informal care to family in the US, the highest proportion among all races/ethnicities. The *stress generated from LT caregiving (CGing) is known to increase coronary heart disease (CHD) risk* Many factors place this group at high risk for CHD, which continues to be the leading cause of death in Hispanic women. For example, women are more susceptible to CHD risk and once diagnosed, have worse health outcomes than men. Hispanic women show a higher-than-average CHD rate; the increase in obesity and diabetes is believed to be the primary reasons for the risen CHD in women. While many *risk factors* may affect the CHD disparities, one understudied factor is the role that *CGing* plays. This risk increases among women who care for their loved ones with CHD may themselves be at higher risk for cardiac problems, which is increase not seen in men caring for their relatives. Despite the fact, *CHD risk in Hispanic woman LT CGs has been understudied*, particularly for Mexican Americans (MAs)--the largest Hispanic subgroup. Attention to heart health in this subpopulation is often neglected.

Understanding the mechanisms linking CGing stress to CHD risk is essential to develop culturally sensitive interventions for this population. *While specific mechanisms are unknown, data point to both physiological and psychosocial underlying factors.* This proposed feasibility study, not meant to statistically analyze the data, will provide preliminary data for the following aims:

- (1) assessing the acceptability of woman CGs' reactions during the one-year study period.
- (2) exploring the practicality of combining psychological (self-reports) and biological (urine and blood) data collection regarding time commitment, demands, and combinations causing restrain in some way.
- (3) adapting a design due to unforeseeable changes of content or procedures.

In addition to quantitative studies, I have published a qualitative study entitled, "The lived experience of the mother-child relationship among traumatic brain injury young adult survivors." This project was supported by a Sigma Theta Tau chapter and earned the 2004 D. Jean Wood nursing scholarship award [Best Presenter of the Year Award] from the Southern Nursing Research Society. In sum, I have experiences in conducting both quantitative (descriptive, experimental) and qualitative research. In specific, instrument development (measurement) is my strong suit.

PERSONAL TEACHING STATEMENT

My teaching belief primarily centers on "epistemology of knowing," that is the process of knowing—a science of becoming—rather than the end results of knowing often used to evaluate students' learning outcomes, e.g., score and grade. To mirror the needs of student population, I recognize one major character of adult learners who have strong motive and potential to learn, they should be continually and purposefully encouraged to sustain their passion during the leaning process until their academic objectives are reached. I understand every so often it only takes one faculty member to inspire students to be a better person. I strive to be the kind of

faculty to identify and assist students in need. I learn to be more understanding and empathetic toward students who are late for classes or submitting assignments, and those who did not perform well in examinations with legitimate reasons (e.g., heavy family or working load.) In my point of view, the academic objectives must be achieved through a student-faculty alliance which students partner with faculty to widen the scope and depth of knowledge base in critical thinking; and to extend the knowledge beyond daily practice to theoretical and research-based application. Due to students' versatility, I need to carefully assess students through an interactive manner with major teaching strategies stated below to achieve professional goals.

To objectively assess their life experiences and knowledge (i.e., readiness, preparedness, and capability) before designing any teaching materials and methodologies for students is a must. In my perspective of teaching and learning, students are like a glass of fluid; not only do we need to assess how full the glass is, but also what the content is in. We cannot simply assume the dark fluid is coffee and thus pouring more coffee in. If it turns out to be coke, we may severely disturb students' thinking schema. Therefore, assessing students is always the primary and first step for me to design my teaching. Knowing (1) who they are (some may be caregivers and/or workers), (2) when they want (may not all be regular weekday working hours), (3) where to give (inside and outside of classroom, simulation lab, online teaching, or mixed), (4) what they need (by the progress designed in textbooks or by priority of students' needs), (5) how to provide the content (lecture, discussion, or simulation in a way most suitable to them), and (6) why they require the knowledge and/or skills. Those are the base for students to advance to the next level of learning. This way, I can foresee and assess what and how may work or not work in order to obtain positive results of teaching and learning.

Due to students' possible responsibility (e.g., parent or job) outside of academia, I have an opendoor policy. When they are active to search an answer to clarify for their questions, the autonomous interactions deserve to be encouraged and respected. It shows that students are goaloriented to actively pursuit the needed knowledge, and I am glad to answer them anytime available in the format they prefer or are convenient for them (via phone, in person, email, [virtual] office hours, Zoom, or web course communication). I recognize students are also social beings; interaction and respect play a key role in student-faculty relationships. In addition to merely be a course instructor, it is essential to develop other approachable functions and roles (e.g., interactive direction as a friend, counselor, mentor, and/or expert) who are able to relate the lesson to their professional and personal goals explicitly so that students can see a reason to learn. By developing students' interests, the *relevancy and goal- orientation* can help students establish values, interests, practicality, and responsibilities in their own progress of learning.

I understand a satisfied student is one who would obtain much knowledge from my teaching. The knowledge could profoundly affect the student in his/her later nursing academic and career development. Hence, as a nursing faculty member, I am more than willing to teach knowledge and skills, as well as being a role model for students to see and learn. I consider what I teach and how I perform my role in front of students will affect them enormously. Thus, I keep reminding myself to function as a role model so students may learn from me not only cognitively, but also in my professional demeanor. In sum, my teaching philosophy and strategies have and will continuously align to the university's vision in providing quality higher education to a diverse student population. Thus, our graduates will be competitive in the global marketplace. Moreover, I have integrated university mission statements into my teaching to advance the profession through embracing faculty roles as an intellectual, cultural, and socioeconomic asset to the

region, offering programs to meet the needs of academia and students, and contributing to the quality of life of the individuals served. A university's vision and mission provide me a clear guidance for my teaching philosophy and strategies.
